WORKPLACES

322 workers from 37 workplaces received wellness checks. 40 individuals were referred for nurse follow-up.

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Turanga Health pilots the Health Quality and Safety Commission's Whakakotahi 2018 programme providing follow-up care in the home for whānau met during Tū Mahi workplace wellness checks.



HOMES

60% of Māori babies exclusively or fully breastfed at six weeks (58% in 2017), and 51% reported to be breastfed at six months.

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Mental health kaimahi met with 48 tangata whaiora 2763 times helping them with transport, exercise and nutrition, counselling and links to support services.

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Rheumatic fever programme staff carried out 75 Healthy Home assessments. 15 whānau were relocated and 65 received education. Bedding went into 10 homes, curtains into 12, and underfloor insulation was installed in three.

COMMUNITIES

461 people take part in 78 Tū Haa outside fitness sessions.

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141 Tū Pakari community physical activity sessions held at local marae, schools and community halls.

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Turanga Health staff assist 166 wāhine whose health records show they're at high risk of developing cervical cancer or are behind in their regular smears to have a smear.



SCHOOLS

Nurses hold puberty and personal hygiene classes for year 7 and 8 students at nine rural schools.

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236 vaccinations against the cancer-causing human papillomavirus (HPV) were given to male and female students across 11 rural schools.

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1263 students have walked a Turanga Health Heritage Trail offering them a physical and emotional connection to the region's stories.



MEDICAL CENTRES

1468 patients enrolled with Waikohu Health Centre as of 30 June 2018.

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125 whānau vaccinated against influenza.

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123 rheumatic fever referrals received then followed up with antibiotic compliance and education.

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22 general practice staff from Three Rivers Medical and City Medical Gisborne take part in the Turanga Health induction programme.



THE DOLLARS & CENTS

Turanga Health's income was \$5,275,445. Of that \$814,608 came from the Ministry of Health, \$2,926,467 from Hauora Tairāwhiti, and \$383,576 from Midlands Health Network. The remainder was from Sport New Zealand, Te Puni Kōkiri, Te Rūnanga o Tūrangānui a Kiwa (Whānau Ora), Eastern Institute of Technology, and the University of Otago. Around 60% was spent on wages to deliver services to whānau in Tūrangānui-a-Kiwa.

This, along with Turanga Health's strong foundation built on kia whai oranga-a-whanau mo nga whakatipuranga, gives me confidence as we continue our mahi with whānau in their kāinga and rohe, and in Tūrangānui-a-Kiwa.
